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Executive Summary

OH Muhlenberg, LLC ("OHM"), a Kentucky limited liability company, is wholly-owned by Owensboro Health Inc. (OHI) and operates Owensboro Health Muhlenberg Community Hospital, a 90 bed acute care hospital in Greenville, Muhlenberg County, Kentucky ("OH Muhlenberg Community Hospital"). Effective July 1, 2015, in connection with the OHM's purchase of substantially all of the assets of Muhlenberg Community Hospital, OHM began leasing and operating the hospital facility under a lease agreement with Muhlenberg Community Hopsital that extends through June 30, 2035.

Owensboro Health Muhlenberg Community Hospital (OHMCH) is pleased to present its 2018-2021 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). This CHNA report includes health assessment data collected in a collaborative process with the Muhlenberg County Health Department. OHMCH contracted with the Community and Economic Development Initiative of Kentucky (CEDIK) to conduct a CHNA In accordance with the Affordable Care Act (ACA) and section 501(r) of the internal revenue code for nonprofit tax-exempt hospitals. This CHNA is the first report prepared by CEDIK for OHMCH. A CHNA for the facility was completed in 2013 when the hospital was under different ownership. This report will be used to create an implementation plan with wide community input to address the identified health needs for the community served by OHMCH over the next three years. OHMCH Board of Directors approved this CHNA on May 18, 2018. The Owensboro Health, Inc. Board of Directors approved this CHNA on May 21, 2018.

Summary of Findings

Methodology

CEDIK facilitated the process of primary data collection through community surveys, focus groups and key informant interviews to create an implementation plan to address identified health needs. In addition, county specific secondary data was gathered to help examine the social determinants of health. Throughout the process, CEDIK and the community steering committee made it a priority to get input from populations that are often not engaged in conversations about their health needs or gaps in service. CEDIK conducted six key informant interviews to probe more deeply into health and quality of life themes within the county. Current community resources and potential barriers to accessing resources were also identified in these interviews.

This CHNA report synthesizes community health needs survey data, focus groups with vulnerable populations, and key informant interview data with social and economic data as well as health outcomes data collected from secondary sources to help provide context for the community. Below are identified themes collected from the primary data collection:

Focus Group Visioning

Residents describe their vision of a vibrant, healthy Muhlenberg County as being one that individuals can work, play and live in a drug-free, smoke-free environment with a variety of opportunities for physical activity and recreation for adults and youth. In addition, residents envision employment at or above a living wage giving them access to healthy, affordable food and transportation to available medical and essential services.

Focus Groups - Unmet Needs

CEDIK conducted focus groups with identified populations in Muhlenberg County that often are not asked to discuss their health needs to deepen the understanding of the health challenges they face. Focus group discussions revealed unmet needs across the low-income and senior populations. Common concerns across these populations include unemployment/job loss, food insecurity, lack of affordable housing, and substandard existing housing. Heart disease, diabetes, dental care needs are common health issues. Additional concerns identified a lack of a primary physician, difficulty in scheduling physician appointments, and a general lack of knowledge of available services in the county.

Key Informant - Community Themes and Strengths

OHMCH, Muhlenberg County Health Department and CEDIK obtained additional primary data through six supplemental interviews with individuals knowledgeable about health and quality of life needs in Muhlenberg County. CEDIK organized the data into strengths, barriers and opportunities for change for Muhlenberg County. Strengths included both healthcare assets (local hospital and new partnership with Owensboro Health, availability of specialty physicians and the FQHC) and community assets (faith-based community, good schools, parks, trails and fitness centers). Challenges faced by residents include lack of transportation (for medical services, grocery or pharmacy), homelessness in the community and elevated poverty rates in the county were identified as barriers or weaknesses. A number of opportunities were highlighted, including economic and job creation opportunities, adding a homeless/emergency shelter, engaged community organization partnerships to promote and enhance resources.

Prioritized Areas

The Muhlenberg County CHNA Steering Committee reviewed survey results, focus group and key informant interview results as well as key secondary health data. The committee considered existing local, state and national priorities, conducted an open discussion and voted on specific strategic initiatives for the county. Members identified current resources and possible barriers to resources that residents may experience. This information can assist both the hospital and the health department, as implementation plans are developed to address the prioritized health needs.

Muhlenberg County CHNA Steering Committee selected the following priority areas for action:

- Residents' (vulnerable populations) lack of knowledge on available community and health resources in the county
- Adult obesity
- Mental health depression, counseling and testing for mental health disorders
- Youth health indicator needs* teen birth rate, obesity, lack of physical activity, lack of out of school meaningful activities
- Substance use prescription, illegal and illicit substances
- *Youth needs are grouped together at the request of the steering committee with the consensus that collaboration between community organizations and integrated programming can better address the needs of youth instead of addressing individual health behaviors.

A plan for addressing these priority areas will be described in OHMCH 2018 Implementation Strategy.

1. Introduction

1.1 CHNA Report Objective

The purpose of a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) is to understand health needs and priorities in a given community, with the goal of addressing those needs through the development of an implementation strategy. Owensboro Health Muhlenberg Community Hospital (OHMCH) and Muhlenberg County Health Department (MCHD) have produced this CHNA in accordance with the Affordable Care Act (ACA) and section 501(r) of the internal revenue service tax code for nonprofit tax exempt hospitals. The results are meant to guide OHMCH and MCHD in the development of an implementation strategy and to help direct overall efforts to impact priority health needs. OHMCH Board of Directors approved this CHNA on May 18, 2018. The Owensboro Health, Inc. Board of Directors approved this CHNA on May 21, 2018.

1.2 Owensboro Health Muhlenberg Community Hospital

Owensboro Health is a nonprofit health system with a mission to heal the sick and to improve the health of the communities it serves in Kentucky and Indiana. The system includes Owensboro Health Muhlenberg Community Hospital. OHMCH is affiliated with Owensboro Health Regional Hospital, the Owensboro Health Medical Group comprising over 180 providers in 30 locations, three outpatient Healthplex facilities, a certified medical fitness facility and the Mitchell Memorial Cancer Center.

As the second largest employer in the county, OHMCH employs nearly 500 personnel. OHMCH serves as a large contributor toward the county in many ways. Beginning in 1938, the facility offered limited services such as medical-surgical, laboratory and radiology. OHMCH has expanded to include outpatient therapies, cardiopulmonary rehabilitation, emergency services, home health, pain management, sleep lab, long-term care and Coal Miners' Respiratory Clinic. 1.3 Muhlenberg County Health Department

The Muhlenberg County Health Department mission is to prevent illness and injury, promote good health and assure a safe environment to protect and improve the health of our citizens. The health department's vision for the community of Muhlenberg County is to have a healthy and safe environment, which allows all children and adults to live so that they are able to prosper physically, emotionally, spiritually and financially in the pursuit of their purpose and dream for their lives. Health department services include clinic services, environmental services, Health Access Nurturing Development Services (H.A.N.D.S.), health education, and WIC.

For the purposes of its CHNA, OHMCH and MCHD have defined the community as its primary service area as Muhlenberg County, Kentucky. Muhlenberg County will serve as the unit of analysis for this CHNA, and health needs discussed will pertain to residents of Muhlenberg County.

2. Evaluation of Progress Since Prior CHNA

In its previous community health needs assessment, priority health areas were categorized under two headings 1) Hospital Specific Needs and 2) Community Specific Needs. At the time of the last assessment Muhlenberg Community Hospital was not affiliated with Owensboro Health, Inc.

Owensboro Health has worked very hard since July 1, 2015 to address identified gaps in services, quality of care and relationship with its community. To that end, many of the concerns and "hospital specific needs" expressed in the previous CHNA have been addressed, improved and resolved. This is reflective in this current (2018-2021) CHNA survey and findings, primary data collection and can be also found in quality indicators by which OHMCH is measured.


The previous CHNA "community specific needs" noted some of the same issues stated in the current CHNA and Owensboro Health Muhlenberg Community Hospital believes its new assessment process and collaborative partnerships in this process have helped to establish a baseline and blueprint from which impactful community driven plans and hospital implementation plan and strategies can be developed.

3. CHNA Process

3.1 CHNA Process Overview

3.2 The Community Steering Committee

The Community Steering Committee plays a vital role in the CHNA process. Individuals that represent agencies and organizations in Muhlenberg County agreed to assist with the collection of community input from a broad representation of the county and in particular, populations that are not often engaged in conversations about their health needs. CEDIK provided a list of potential agencies and organizations that the hospital and health department could utilize to recruit members to the committee. (See next page for the list of community members who served on the committee.)

The Community Steering Committee met twice as a group and each time a hospital and health department representative opened the meetings with appreciation of the members' service, the purpose of the CHNA and the importance of the members' active involvement and input. CEDIK presented the CHNA process at the first meeting and the important role of the steering committee in the distribution and collection of the community surveys (including a shareable mobile survey link and paper surveys), identifying locations and contacts for potential focus groups and key informant interviews. To conclude the meeting, the CEDIK facilitator conducted the first formal focus group discussion with the committee.

After five weeks of survey distribution and collection, the Steering Committee met for the second time to review survey results, focus group and key informant interview results as well as key secondary health data. Members identified current resources and barriers to the resources that community members may experience that can assist both the hospital and the health department, as implementation plans are developed to address the prioritized health needs.


Figure 2. Wordle summary of responses to community survey open-ended question, "What could be done in Muhlenberg County to better meet your health needs?"







Respondents that are satisfied with ability to access health care services in Muhlenberg County.




Respondents that delayed health care due to lack of money and/or insurance.




Respondents that are currently without health insurance.



How far respondents travel to see a specialist:






2.64 Average respondent rating of the overall health of Muhlenberg County.

Scale: 1=very unhealthy to 5=very healthy


3.68 Average respondent rating of their own health.

5.2 Focus Groups

Four focus groups were conducted in the area the Owensboro Health Muhlenberg Community Hospital patients reside. These groups were conducted as separate meetings or in conjunction with other regularly scheduled meetings in the county. Thirty-four individuals participated representing underserved populations that include children, families and seniors. The focus groups were conducted in the months of February and March of 2018.

Below is a list of questions and topics discussed within the groups as participants shared their thoughts, opinions and healthcare needs.

What are the most significant health problems in Muhlenberg County?

- Access to mental health services prevention and treatment for alcohol, drugs, depression and other mental health concerns for all ages
- Food insecurity children and seniors
- Heart Disease
- Obesity
- Diabetes

- Smoking adult and youth
- Dental care and prevention children and adults
- Teen Pregnancy
- Lack of affordable housing or existing housing substandard
- Transportation costs and difficulty traveling to specialty appointment in nearby counties
- Unemployment/loss of jobs

- Physician appointments both difficult to schedule and long wait times at the office (overbooked)

6. Selected Priority Areas

The Owensboro Health Muhlenberg Community Hospital and the Muhlenberg County Public Health Department hosted the second CHNA steering committee meeting March 26, 2018 for members of the community steering committee to review findings from the community surveys, focus groups, key informant interviews and county specific secondary health data.

The process of priority selection followed the Association for Community Health Improvement (ACHI) recommendations to consider:

- The magnitude of the problem (i.e., the number of people or the percentage of a population impacted).
- The severity of the problem (i.e., the degree to which health status is worse than the national norm).
- A high need among vulnerable populations.
- The community's capacity/willingness to act on the issue.
- The ability to have a measurable impact on the issue.
- · Community resources already focused on the issue.
- Whether the issue is a root cause of other problems.

Members of the committee discussed the findings and based on all of the information identified the following as areas of needs to address in the next three years:

- Residents' (vulnerable populations) lack of knowledge on available community and health resources in the county
- Adult obesity
- Mental health depression, counseling and testing for mental health disorders
- Youth health indicator needs* teen birth rate, obesity, lack of physical activity, lack of out of school meaningful activities
- Substance use prescription, illegal and illicit substances

^{*}Youth needs are grouped together at the request of the steering committee with the consensus that collaboration between community organizations and integrated programming can better address the needs of youth instead of addressing individual health behaviors.

7. Conclusion

Muhlenberg County is a community with many assets, with a caring community spirit being an important driver in the approach to community health improvements through collaborative efforts. While there are many areas of need in the county, this report identifies priority areas that Owensboro Health Muhlenberg Community Hospital will use for guidance in planning its community benefit efforts and strategic direction for addressing health needs related to obesity, substance use, mental health and youth health needs (obesity, lack of physical activity and teen pregnancy). Further investigation may be necessary for determining and implementing the most effective interventions.

An implementation strategy will be developed and rolled out over the next three years; periodic evaluation of goals/objectives for each identified priority will be conducted to assure that progress is on track per the implementation plan.
